Focus on Asia

After his arrival in Goa in 1542, St. Francis Xavier visited the tomb of St. Thomas the Apostle in Mylapore in southern India [now part of Madras or Chennai, then in Portuguese India].

He left India in spring of 1545 for Portuguese Malacca, then in January 1546 to the Maluku Islands, where the Portuguese had some settlements.

In January 1548 he returned to Goa to attend to his responsibilities as superior of the mission there. He came to be admired for his ability to live and work side by side with the poor.

The next 15 months were occupied with various journeys and administrative measures.

He left Goa on 15 April 1549, to seek more converts and his stops included Ceylon [now Sri Lanka], the Molucca Islands, the Banda Islands and the Malay Peninsula.

On 15 August 1549, St. Xavier landed at Kagoshima, Japan, where, as he had at his other missions, adapted to local mores and arranged for the translation of religious texts.

These steps helped him reach more converts in the year and a half he spent in Japan.

His next focus was China.

He traveled to Sancian [Shangchuan] Island, near Canton [today called Guangzhou], but was not able to access the mainland because borders had been closed to foreigners.

Before he could find a way inside the country, illness incapacitated him.

He died on the island on December 3, 1552, at the age of 46.

His body was then taken to Goa where it lies to this day, without turning to dust, in a silver casket in the Church of Bom Jesus Basilica.

Though he passed away at a relatively young age, St. Xavier had accomplished much in his life.

In addition to being a founding member of the Jesuit order—the Society of Jesus was officially recognized by Pope Paul III in 1540—he baptized an estimated 30,000 people.

He was beatified by Pope Paul V in 1619, and canonized by Pope Gregory XV in 1622. A famed missionary himself, he is the patron saint of missionaries.



Fr. Donal Lehane



When Parkinson's disease first afflicted Fr. Donal Lehane in 1981, he continued his ministry, until his retirement in 1985 at age 70 after 40 years as a priest.

An article in the March 2006 edition of the *Diocesan Messenger* titled 'Fr. Donal Lehane a Cheerful and Kind Priest' states that he was fortunate to meet in Victoria a new couple, George and Mary Leung, who had come from Hong Kong with their

family.

When the Leungs moved to Vancouver, he joined them a few years later.

And when he required hospital care, the family and especially a daughter, a registered nurse, Mrs. Julia Pugh, assumed responsibility for his care.

This cheerful and hopeful disciple of Christ died peacefully on December 31, 2005, at age 90, in West Vancouver.

Fr. Lehane was predeceased by his parents, Donal and Ada, and his sister, Mrs. Mary Hinds.

Prayers were held on January 5 at 7 p.m. at St. Andrew's Cathedral while the funeral Mass was celebrated by Bishop Richard Gagnon the next day at 2 p.m. at the cathedral. He was interred at Ross Bay Cemetery.
