Returning To Give Thanks



While reading the story of the ten lepers, where only one returned to give thanks for his healing, I felt a sense of conviction.

washed clean (baptized) Catholic who belongs to a wonderful parish, am I like the nine who went away cleansed, those who didn't stop to

comprehend at all who was behind the healing and to completely appreciate that they had not only been given the gift of health but also the gift of restored community?

It's pretty typical for us all to attend Mass, get our duty done and then head out to get on with 'normal' life but maybe what we all need to do is take a few moments in Mass to heave a sigh of relief and gratitude. We have been cleansed and given access to the enfolding and healing arms of Christ and community. It's not because we are so good and it's not because we are Catholics. Jesus didn't ask any of the 10 for their spiritual credentials or ask if they deserved healing. He simply gave healing love because he was asked for it.

It is also noteworthy that the one who returned to give thanks was an outsider to the Jewish faith, a Samaritan. Perhaps that's what made him so grateful. He was not an entitled insider who felt that being Jewish made him more deserving of Jesus's compassion. He was perhaps more acutely aware of the gracious goodness of Jesus because he knew he was an outsider and Jesus still healed him, no questions asked.

We not only need to appreciate the healing gift of Jesus in the Eucharist but also the beautiful community that surrounds us. If you've never been an outsider it might be difficult to fully grasp the gift of a spiritual family we all have been given. We take it for granted because it's always there whether we embrace it and interact with it or not. With faith, give thanks for Jesus and for the community.

And you will be made well.

ST. TERESA OF ÁVILA 15 October

St. Teresa of Ávila, born on March 28, 1515 in Ávila, Spain, died on October 4, 1582, in Alba de Tormes, was canonized in 1622. Teresa was a Spanish nun, one of the great mystics and religious women of the Roman Catholic Church, and an author of a number of spiritual classics. She initiated the Carmelite Reform, which restored and emphasized the austerity

and contemplative character of Carmelite life. John Baptist Rossi, the Carmelite prior general from Rome, went to Ávila in 1567 and approved the reform, directing Teresa to found more convents and to establish monasteries. That same year, while at Medina del Campo, Spain, she met a young Carmelite priest, Juan de Yepes (later St. John of the Cross, the poet and mystic), who she realized could initiate the Carmelite Reform for men. A year later Juan opened the first monastery of the Primitive Rule at Duruelo, Spain.

St. Teresa was elevated to doctor of the church in 1970 by Pope Paul VI, the first woman to be so honoured.

ST. MARIE-MARGUERITE **D'YOUVILLE** 16 October

St. Marie-Marguerite d'Youville was the first Canadian-born saint. Born October 15, 1701 at Varennes, Quebec, through the influence

of her great grandfather, Pierre Boucher, she studied at the Ursulines in Quebec. Upon her return, she became an invaluable support to

her mother and undertook the education of her brothers and sisters.



In 1722, she married François d'Youville. However, four of her six children died in infancy, and François, too, was seriously ill. She faithfully cared for him until his death in 1730. In all this suffering, Marguerite recognized God's presence and his love, undertaking many charitable works with complete trust in God. Marguerite was soon joined by three young women who shared her love for the poor. On December 31, 1737, they consecrated themselves to God and promised to serve him in the poor. Marguerite had become the foundress of the Sisters of Charity of Montreal, the "Grey Nuns".

In 1747, now known as "mother of the poor", she became director of the Charon Brothers Hospital in Montreal which was falling into ruin. She and her sisters rebuilt the hospital and cared for those in most desperate human misery. In 1765, when a fire destroyed the hospital, she asked her sisters and the poor who lived at the hospital to recognize the hand of God in this disaster and to offer him praise. At age 64, she undertook the reconstruction of this shelter for those in need. Totally exhausted from a lifetime of selfgiving, Marguerite died on December 23, 1771: remembered always as a loving mother who served Jesus Christ in the poor. Pope John XXIII beatified Marguerite on May 3, 1959 and called her "Mother of Universal Charity".

ST. IGNATIUS **OF ANTIOCH** 17 October


St. Ignatius of Antioch (died c. 110, Rome: Western feast day October 17; Eastern feast day December 20) was the bishop of Antioch, Syria (now in Turkey), known mainly from seven highly regarded letters that he wrote

during a trip to Rome, as a prisoner condemned to be executed for his beliefs. He was apparently eager to counteract the teachings of two groups, the Judaizers, who did not accept the authority of the New Testament, and the Docetists, who held that Christ's sufferings and death were apparent but not real. The letters have often been cited as a source of knowledge of the Christian church at the beginning of the 2nd century.

ST. LUKE 18 October

St. Luke was born in Syria and according to tradition, he died at age of 84, in Boeotia, Greece, where he had settled to write the Gospels. St. Luke's tomb was initially in Thebes, Greece. His relics were transferred to Constantinople in the year 357. Christians believe he was the author of the Gospel of St. Luke and the Acts of the Apostles.



Luke had a unique perspective on Jesus, and this can be seen by the eighteen parables and six miracles not found in the other gospels. Luke's gospel seems to focus or highlight social justice and the poor. He tells the story of Lazarus and the rich man who ignored him. In the beatitudes, he is the only one who uses "blessed are the poor" rather than "blessed are the poor in spirit". Luke's gospel is the only one that we hear of Mary's Magnificat. He is known to have worked with Paul, remaining with him until his death. He had a very close relationship with Mary and brought us many Scriptural teachings on the life of Mary that other Gospel's didn't. Forgiveness and God's mercy to sinners is also of first importance to St. Luke, in his writings about the Prodigal Son being welcomed back. Throughout St. Luke's gospel, Jesus takes the side of the sinner who wants to return to God's mercy. He was one who loved the poor, respected women, and was a physician by profession.
