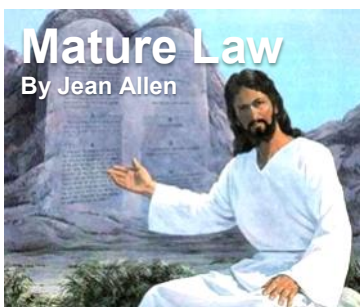
Hillel the Elder, a contemporary of Jesus, was once asked by a pagan to teach him the Torah while standing on one foot. Hillel said, "What is hateful to you, do not do to your neighbour. The rest is just commentary."

When Jesus stated that he did not come to abolish the law but to fulfill it, this was the law he was talking about. In fact, Jesus himself said that the two greatest commandments were to love God and love your neighbour as you love yourself. He said that on these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets. So, in this Gospel where he said that not one stroke will pass from the law until all is accomplished, he was not speaking of all the man-made laws that had accumulated over the centuries that were the Jewish purity code; he was talking about the essence, the heart of the law: love God and love your neighbour. This is the law Jesus lived. It is the law he fulfilled.

This Gospel directly follows the beatitudes and the salt and light teachings and Jesus was still teaching what the essence of the law really meant. It is not outward observance – it is inner transformation. One scripture scholar said that by fulfilling the law, Jesus brings it (present tense!) to maturity by revealing its deepest purpose, which is a right relationship with God, with one another and with all creation. For this scholar, fulfillment does not mean tighter rules but expanded awareness of the heart of God. (Michael Morwood)

To Jesus, this law extends to the minutiae of life. It's not enough to refrain from killing somebody; we are called, through inner transformation, to refrain from even resenting anyone and to be conscious of the need for forgiveness of and reconciliation with those who offend us. It's not what everybody else can see you doing, like attending Mass or saying your prayers regularly, that creates inner freedom; it's paying attention to the health of your inner person while doing those things.

If you ask, Jesus will bring your inner being to maturity. It's what he does.

LENTEN FAST AND ABSTINENCE

(Ash Wednesday, February 18, and Good Friday, April 3.)

Fasting, almsgiving, and prayer are the three disciplines of Lent.

Abstinence is observed from age 14 and older. Fasting is to be observed from age 18, and those who have not yet celebrated their 60th birthday.

The faithful and catechumens undertake these practices of penance seriously in preparation for baptism and the renewal of baptismal vows at Easter.

Fridays of Lent are compulsory days of abstinence: no meat is allowed during meals. In Canada, Catholics may substitute an act of charity in place of abstinence. However, some form of penitential discipline must be undertaken.

On a Fast Day one full meal is allowed. Two other meals to maintain strength may be taken, according to one's needs. They should not add up to another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted. Plain water is allowed at any time.

Please Note: when health or ability to work are seriously affected, the law does not oblige. When in doubt concerning fast and abstinence, consult the parish priest.

Our Lenten Journey

The rich symbolism and meaning in the Church's Liturgical Cycle assists us in our salvation journey. Ash Wednesday begins Lent: the season of fasting and prayer that spans 46 days before Easter Sunday. The practice of Ash Wednesday comes from the ancient Jewish tradition of penance and fasting that includes placing ashes on the head to symbolize the dust from which God made us, and grief, which in this case, is grief that we have sinned and caused our division from God. Hence the reminder, when the priest says on Ash Wednesday: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." or: "Repent and believe in the Gospel."



The ashes are made from blessed palm branches from the previous year's Palm Sunday Mass: creating a link in the Liturgical Year by using the symbol of the

triumphant entry of Jesus into Jerusalem that begins Holy Week, with the ashes distributed on Ash Wednesday the following Season of Lent. This reminds us that life is transient and we are on a pilgrim journey to eternity. This also reinforces that each gesture, symbol, and prayer in Sacred Liturgy through each Liturgical Calendar, is filled with purpose to focus our hearts and minds on God through our daily life each year.

The Ordo reminds us that the Liturgies of Lent focuses on two themes: Baptism and Penance (reconciliation and conversion). Lent invites us through prayer, penance, and reconciliation, to prepare ourselves for the renewal of our Baptismal promises at Easter. This leads us to the highest point in the Church's calendar; the three-day memorial celebration: the Sacred Paschal Triduum, or Easter Triduum that begins on Maundy Thursday (April 2) and ends with the Easter Vigil on Saturday (April 4).

And so to contrast our Lenten journey to the light of Easter:

- the "Gloria" and "Alleluia" are not sung, and the Mass parts are the Roman Missal Chants (Sunday Missal, pp 619 to 627);
- Gospel Acclamation: "Praise to You, Lord, King of Eternal Glory!"
- Memorial Acclamation: "Save Us, Saviour of the World, for by Your Cross and Resurrection, You have set us Free!"
- flowers are absent from the Altar and its surroundings;
- silence is observed to contemplate on Christ's Redemptive Sacrifice for us.

This makes the proclamation and celebration of our Lord's Resurrection all the more glorious and triumphant at Easter. As St. Paul said: "If Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins." (1 Corinthians 15:17)

Grateful thanks to Stan Dzbik and Jim Haffey for burning the palms every year; and we thank Fr. Alfredo Monacelli, Lin, and Susan from St. Joseph the Worker Parish for joining us to sift the Holy ashes this year.

Five Conditions of a Good Confession

1. Examination of Conscience
2. Repentance and remorse for one's sins: arising from faith and love of God.
3. Firmly resolve not to sin, or repeat a sin again.
4. Confess and disclose the sins to a priest.
5. Fully intend to make reparation, and do works of reparation for the sins.
